## Glossary of terms.

Word	Definition
<b>A.D</b>	Anno Domini which is Latin for the year of our Lord.
<b>Ancient</b>	It is from a time that no longer exists- it is Ancient.
<b>Archaeologist</b>	People who work out our history by looking at artefacts that have been found.
<b>Artefact</b>	An object made by human beings usually of historical or cultural interest.

<b>B.C</b>	Before the birth of Jesus Christ.
<b>B.C.E</b>	Before the common era.
<b>Cause</b>	It didn't just happen by accident- something caused it to happen.
<b>C.E</b>	Common era.
<b>Century</b>	100 years.
<b>Chronology</b>	The ordering of events or dates in time order.
<b>Civilisation</b>	A large group of people who share a certain advanced way of living and working.
<b>Consequence</b>	Something that happens as a result of something else.
<b>Continuity</b>	It continues over time.
<b>Decade</b>	Ten years.
<b>Democracy</b>	Democracy means allowing citizens to make their own decisions for their own personal lives.
<b>Differences</b>	Something that is different.
<b>Excavate</b>	To remove earth carefully.
<b>Millennium</b>	1,000 years.
<b>Significance</b>	A person or event that changes people's lives at the time or after.
<b>Similarities</b>	Something that is the same.
<b>Source</b>	A source give us an understanding of things that have happened in the past from the point of view of the people who lived through them.
<b>Valid</b>	An argument or point of view that makes sense and can be backed up with evidence.
